Steven Van Uytsel is Associate Professor in the Faculty of Law at Kyushu University (Japan). He received his legal education at the University of Antwerp. During his studies at the University of Antwerp, he spent half a year at Uppsala University in the framework of the European ERASMUS Exchange program. He then went on to complete his LL.M. & LL.D. at Kyushu University and his Master of Arts (Japanese Studies) at the Mercator Hogeschool. Steven specializes in competition law, with a particular interest in enforcement issues and the position of competition law in countries in transition.
